OPERATIONS DIVISION

In November, Middleton Officers handled 1,409 calls for service, 465 were field initiated, 944 were dispatched, issued 236 citations and 78 written warnings, made 33 criminal arrests and investigated 49 accidents.

In December, Middleton Officers handled 1,374 calls for service, 422 were field initiated, 952 were dispatched, issued 188 citations and 57 written warnings, made 19 criminal arrests and investigated 36 accidents.

Significant Events in December:

MI14-6481, Chalmers Jewelers, 6202 University Avenue, Burglary

On 12-01-14, at 4:51 AM, a nearby resident reported three male suspects attempting to break into Chalmers Jewelry Store. Middleton officers responded to the call and established a perimeter around the establishment. As officers arrived on scene, the suspects were already fleeing the building. Responding officers engaged in foot pursuits and captured two of the suspects. Both suspects have been charged with this burglary and several others throughout Dane County. The investigation into this crime spree is still on-going.

MI14-6490, Milio's Sandwiches, 6234 University Avenue, Theft

On 12-01-14, at 3:20 PM, a suspect entered the sandwich shop and stole a UW Children's Hospital donation jar full of currency. The unidentified suspect was described as a black female in her late 30's to early 40's, 5'6" tall, average build and was wearing a camouflaged jacket. Store surveillance videos, investigative interviews and a photo line-up have assisted the investigating officer in identifying the suspect in this theft. Theft charges are forthcoming.

MI14-6499, Bristled Boar Saloon, 2611 Branch Street, Theft

On 12-01-14, at 10:23 PM, a female victim reported that unknown persons stole money from her wallet. Upon their arrival, officers found that the theft had occurred on the previous evening and the suspects were captured on the tavern's security cameras. The suspects were described as a white couple in their mid-thirties. No arrests have yet been made in this case.

MI14-6347, Private Residence, 1300 Block North High Point Road, Animal Bite

On 12-03-14, at 8:05 AM, Middleton Officers were dispatch to a dog bite call which had occurred outside of a private residence. The victim, a 58 year old Middleton resident, was walking by the home when two dogs came charging at him. The victim received a significant bite wound to his leg. The animal and its owners were later identified by Middleton Officers. It was confirmed that this animal had bitten humans on two occasions. The animal was quarantined for ten days and, after the dog was officially declared a "Dangerous Animal", the owners met with police officials to develop a safety plan that must be followed or the dog would be seized.

MI14-6605, Harrington Tree Service, 1630 North High Point Road, Stolen Vehicle

On 12-06-14, Middleton Police Officers were called to the above address to take a report of a stolen 1994 Ford pickup truck. Officers immediately confirmed that this was the same vehicle that was stolen and returned less than a month ago. Witness statements and retail security video confirmed that the same two suspects who had stolen the truck last month, had taken it this time. The two suspects, a homeless married couple in their 30's, were located and arrested.

MI14-6674, Bristled Boar Saloon, 2611 Branch Street, Theft

Two suspects used a fraudulent credit card to run up a \$120.00 tab at the tavern. Once confronted about the card not processing, the suspects fled the establishment. The suspects in this case have been identified and officers are continuing attempts to locate and charge these individuals.

MI14-6707, Harbor Athletic Club, 2529 Allen Boulevard, Theft

On 12-10-14, at 9:36 PM, a male victim reported that his wallet and cash were stolen from an unlocked locker in the club's locker room. No suspects have been located.

MI14-6789, PDQ Store, 6519 Century Avenue, Theft

On 12-15-14, at 9:25 PM, the store clerk reported to police that a larger black male entered the store and stole a donation jar for the VFW Memorial Fund. The suspect was described as being 6'2" tall, 250-300 pounds and was wearing a black sweater and white undershirt. As of this date, no suspects have been identified.

MI14-6809, Public Roadway, 1000 Block North Gammon Road, Weapons Violation On 12-15-14, at 11:39 PM, an off duty Dane County Deputy reported to the Middleton Police Department that he witnessed the occupants of two dark colored sedans fire several gunshots at one another. No suspects or victims have been identified at this time.

During the month of December, several Middleton neighborhoods saw significant increases in petty crime. Residents of the Arbor Lakes Apartment complex reported eight incidents of vandalized vehicles in December. The downtown and Stonefield neighborhoods reported seven incidents of damaged or stolen exterior holiday lights. There were eight thefts from unlocked automobile calls for service in the Fortune Road and Sweeney Drive neighborhood during the final week of December.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES

Our Department is fortunate enough to have two officers qualified in Child Passenger Safety with both Officer Jill Tutaj and Officer Julie Carbon being certified. Our CPS certified officers assisted three families this month with installing their car seats.

Regular directed traffic patrol focused on Neighborhood Projects that were assigned to the Neighborhood Officer for traffic complaints. The Neighborhood Project worked on this month was a report of the green light duration being too short at Century Avenue and Hedden Road.

Middleton Officers also made three arrests for Operating While under the Influence. These traffic stops yielded the following citations:

- 3 citations for OWI
- 2 citations for Prohibited Alcohol Content
- 1 citation for No Insurance
- 1 citation for Moving Violation
- 1 citation for Open Intoxicants

In total, Middleton officers issued 154 traffic citations and 57 warnings for the month of December.

There were 34 reportable accidents during December, of which ten were in parking lots. This is compared to 43 reportable accidents in December 2013, of which nine were in parking lots.

INVESTIGATIVE UNIT REPORT

The month of October was a relatively busy one for the Investigative Services Bureau (ISB). We reviewed 89 cases and 19 of those were assigned to detectives for follow up. The assigned cases consisted of burglaries, sexual assaults, thefts, frauds, threats, and death investigations. The detectives also finished up the remaining background investigations on potential new officers.

One of the more substantial crimes investigated was a burglary to Chalmer's Jewelers in the 6200 block of University Avenue in the early morning hours of December 1st. Thanks to an observant citizen calling to report the burglary, third shift officers were able to respond quickly and set up a perimeter. After a short foot pursuit, those officers were able to take two of the three suspects into custody immediately. Subsequent work, completed by a detective, involved search warrants and several interviews. The lengthy investigation led to burglary charges on two individuals for their involvement in the Chalmer's incident as well as another commercial burglary that took place on November 30th in Middleton. Madison Police were also involved as there was a confession to a commercial burglary on November 30th in their city as well. The investigation is still ongoing as the search for the third involved party continues.

Another significant call involving ISB in December was a death investigation in the 4800 block of Parmenter Street. The initial call was for a possible pulseless non-breathing 32 year old male. Upon arrival, resuscitation efforts began and the subject was transported to the hospital where he later died. Subsequent investigation led to the discovery that he had just ingested heroin prior to experiencing this medical emergency. As the investigation continued, detectives made an arrest of the subject who had allegedly provided the fatal dose of heroin. This investigation continues as numerous interviews and search warrants have been conducted. Detectives are awaiting the toxicology report for the deceased individual and may have additional criminal charges in the future.

SCHOOL LIAISON OFFICER REPORT

Middleton High School Officer Rich O'Connor

December was a very short month at the Middleton High School as students had the last two weeks off for winter break. There were 27 calls for service requiring reports and/or investigations between the Middleton High School and the Clark Street Community School. Some of those calls included a theft from the nature preserve; 911 hang ups; threats being made over Facebook; fights; criminal damage; annoying phone calls; and several lost and stolen cell phones.

Officer O'Connor gave a 90 minute presentation to seven different health classes about drugs and alcohol. Topics of the presentation included several types of commonly abused drugs, their dangers and legal/school consequences. Officer O'Connor spoke in a classroom about the dangers of sexting and answered lots of questions from the students.

He also held an informal question/answer at the Clark Street Community High School to give the students a chance to get to know him and ask whatever they wanted. It was voluntary and was attended by about 40 students.

Officer O'Connor made a public service announcement video about the dangers of sexting that was viewed by all students. He also made a training video on school response to active shooters that will be shown to all district staff.

Officer O'Connor also organized a K9 sniff of hallway lockers and parking lots at the Middleton High School, the Clark Street Community School, and the Kromrey Middle School. There were five K9s from surrounding agencies that participated. There were no drugs found at the Middleton High School.

Kromrey Middle School Officer Tom Wilson

In December, I finished teaching the GREAT Program to the 6th grade students. During the last week of class, all of the students presented their final projects. Some of these included a variety of fundraisers for MOM and the Dane County Humane Society. Another was a school wide toy drive. Then, on the evening of December 10, about 275 students and parents attended the GREAT completion ceremony where the students were presented with their certificates and got to have pizza and refreshments while they were recognized for their accomplishments in the program.



During the month, I also assisted in our school lockdown drill, school K9 drill/search, and assisted with the All School Dance. I also handled several calls for service during the month including several disturbances and thefts.
