ITEMS OF INTEREST

On Monday, April 6, two new officers joined the Middleton Police Department.

Kathleen Riffenburg joins the Middleton Police Department by way of the Bakersfield-California Police Department, where she was an officer for over six years. Prior to her employment at Bakersfield Police Department, Kathleen was a Naval Corpsman and received her Bachelor's Degree from the University of Hawaii. Kathleen has relocated to the Middleton area with her 12 year old son, Micah.

Scott Moen was born and raised in La Crosse and is a 2005 graduate of the University of Wisconsin. Scott worked for the Whitewater Police Department for two years prior to coming to Middleton.

Both officers are beginning their four month Field Training Program and will be on probation for 18 months.

On April 21, Middleton Police Department's newest police officer was sworn in at a ceremony at the Middleton City Hall. Jesse Sellek comes to us from Henderson, Nevada, where he served as a patrol officer with the Henderson Police Department. He is a graduate of Western Illinois University where he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Law Enforcement and Justice Administration. The addition of Officer Sellek brings the Middleton Police Department up to its authorized strength of 36 sworn officers, although Officer Ken Smith has been deployed to Iraq with the Wisconsin National Guard for the year.

04/15/09, 3:34 PM, MI09-2588, 5400 Century Avenue, Theft from Vehicle

Neighbors reported seeing three men breaking the window of a car. It was determined that a number of items were taken from the car including a cell phone. The investigating officer called the stolen cell phone number and pretended to be the victim. He told the person who answered the phone that his cell had important business numbers in it and offered to pay the person \$600.00 to return it. Incredibly, the suspect agreed. They agreed to meet at the McDonald's in Shorewood Hills, where two of the men were taken into custody by officers and detectives. Marshaun D, Williams, 27, and Victor Uscanga, 17, both of Madison, were charged with numerous crimes.

04/15/09, 3:18 AM, MI09-2579, Capital Ice, Burglary

Capital Ice reported two burglaries earlier in the month. Police put a portable alarm and video in the business. The alarm went off and the police observed the suspect inside but he was able to exit before a perimeter could be set up. Officers were able to get a plate number as the suspect sped away and arrested him later in the morning. Nineteen year old Deon Howard, Madison, was arrested for two counts of burglary. Investigation continues on the other burglary.

04/26/09, 4:41 PM, MI09-2873, Costco, Shoplifting

Store employees observed three subjects hide seven bottles of alcohol on their person, valued at over \$200.00 and then attempt to leave the store. They were confronted at the exit to the store and ran. As employees closed in on them in the parking lot, a man began throwing the stolen bottles of liquor at store employees. Thirty-seven year old Tyrees Scott, Madison, was jailed on a probation hold, Operating after Revocation, two counts of 2nd Degree Recklessly Endangering Safety, Criminal Damage and Retail Theft. Thirty-six year old Nyoka Tabor was jailed on a probation hold, Resisting Arrest and Retail Theft.

OPERATIONS DIVISION

Probationary officers Chris Formby, Nick Stroik and Jessica Quamme are on solo patrol, but are closely monitored by supervisors and their mentors. Officers Formby and Stroik are working on 2nd detail (3:00 PM to 11:00 PM) and Officer Quamme is working 3rd detail (11:00 PM to 7:00 AM). All three officers are performing well and are welcome additions to the Department.

Activity

In March, Middleton Officers handled 1677 calls for service, 711 field initiated, 966 dispatched, issued 483 citations, made 30 criminal arrests and investigated 27 accidents.

In April, Middleton Officers handled 1565 calls for service, 711 field initiated, 854 dispatched, issued 515 citations, made 37 criminal arrests and investigated 22 accidents.

Significant Events in April

04/01/09, MI09-2194, 5300 Century Avenue, Fraud

A man received an unsolicited check in the mail for \$2,495.00 with instructions to cash it and return all but \$200.00 to the sender. The instructions indicated the sender was a secret shopper company and the man would receive additional instructions. The man cashed the check, sent all but \$200.00 back to the company in Canada, but was then informed by his bank that the check was no good. The man is now responsible for repaying the bank \$2,250.00. This is a common fraud and the police have little chance of being able to get the man's money back.

04/02/09, MI09-2222, Northlake Neighborhood, Burglary and Theft from Vehicles

There were numerous reports of theft from vehicles and at least one burglary in the Northlake Neighborhood. Cars were entered, either parked in the street, driveway or unlocked garages and money and electronic equipment were stolen.

04/08/09, MI09-2394, 7400 Century Avenue, Burglary

Resident reported that between 11:00 AM and 2:20 PM, unknown person(s) entered his apartment and took a computer, electronic equipment and then stole a tan Isuzu Trooper out of his garage.

04/09/09, MI09-2427, 5500 Sedgemoor Road, Fraud

Complainant sent \$6,500.00 to someone thinking he was purchasing a 2006 Honda through Ebay. This was a fraudulent transaction.

04/13/09, 8:36 PM, MI09-2537, 8300 Airport Road, Injury OWI Accident

The Middleton Police Department responded to a report of an injury accident on Airport Road. Investigation revealed that one vehicle rear ended another vehicle. The driver and passenger in the lead vehicle were injured. The driver of the following vehicle, 32 year old Middleton resident Benjamin Johnson, stated he was on his way to work at UW Hospital where he is employed as a Pharmacist. Johnson was cited for Causing Injury While Intoxicated.

04/14/09, 2:06 PM, MI09-2552, 6300 Maywood Avenue, Burglary

The resident of a duplex returned home and observed two men leaving his home. He chased after them, but they got away. Investigation showed that the suspects were in the freezer because meat had been removed and left on the kitchen table, a furnace duct had been removed and a safe stolen.

04/15/09, MI09-2585, 2200 Pleasant View Road, Burglary

Several storage units were broken into.

04/29/09, 2:50 PM, MI09-2936, Costco, Shoplifting

Three females stole several bottles of Hennessy Brandy valued at over \$300.00.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES

During the month of April there were a total of 22 accidents of which five were in parking lots, a 15% reduction from April 2008, which had 26 accidents of which seven were in parking lots. These figures show the continuing trend of a good percentage of accidents occurring on private property or parking lots due to the increasing number of commercial properties within the city. The Police Department is limited in what it can do to reduce parking lot accidents as no enforcement action can be taken on private property other than hit and run, reckless driving and intoxicated driving offenses.

Delivery was taken of the Harley Davidson Electra Glide police motorcycle. It is ready for patrol purposes and will be ridden by Officer Mike Wood beginning part time in May prior to regular shift as he is field training a new officer. Air Graphics graciously donated the graphics for the motorcycle.

Sgt. Mueller and Community Services Manager Mark Walther attended a regional traffic incident management meeting sponsored by Wisconsin DOT at their Madison eastside office. Mark also attended a morning session of Train the Trainer in traffic incident management. Sgt. Mueller has attended that training in the past. The training instructs on how to safely set up an accident investigation zone and how to minimize the time required for clearing the scene thereby freeing up officers' time and clearing the roadway for regular use as quickly as possible.

April 27 saw the start of the annual Slow Down campaign which Middleton has participated in since its inception. Signs are available at the Police Department.

We were also notified that the Green-Yellow-Red campaign will again be undertaken this coming summer, some of which will be taking place at Middleton's Quaker Steak and Lube.

Directed traffic patrols were performed on 25 occasions for a total of 108 hours and 35 minutes. Full staffing on second shift accounted for being able to get an officer on traffic patrol for many more days than in prior months this year. Streets patrolled were: Airport Road, Allen Boulevard, Branch Street, Boundary Road at Stonefield Road, Century

Avenue, Donna Drive, Elmwood Avenue, Greenway Station area, Hwy Q, Hwy 12, Maywood Avenue, N Gammon Road, N High Point Road, N Westfield Road, Nursery Drive, Park Street, Parmenter Street, Pheasant Branch Road, Pleasant View Road, Stonefield Road and University Avenue. Enforcement action: 70 citations for Speeding with 25 warnings, 15 citations for various Failure to Stop for Sign/Signal with two warnings, five citations for Failure to Fasten Seatbelt with one warning, four citations for OAS/OAR, three citations for Registration violations and six warnings, two No Driver's License citations, two citations for Failure to Notify DOT of Address Change, five various Equipment warnings, one citation for Possession of Marijuana and one warrant served. In addition, a traffic count for two hours during the afternoon rush hour on N Westfield Road showed 149 vehicles with 71 under the 25 MPH speed limit and seven at 33 MPD or greater with the fastest at 37 MPH.

OWI patrols were done on April 10 and 25 with 22 stops made. Citations were: two for OWI, three for OAR/OAS, three for Failure to Stop for Sign, two for Speeding, one for Open Intoxicants and 15 warnings.

INVESTIGATIVE UNIT REPORT

On April 15, 2009, at approximately 3:30 PM, Middleton Police Dispatch received the report of vandalism in progress at 5405 Century Avenue. The caller stated that she had just observed two male Hispanics walk up to a vehicle and smash the side window out. The caller then stated that the suspects entered the vehicle, stole several items and then fled with a third suspect in a tan Toyota Camry.

As officers were responding to this call for service, they were diverted to respond to Scott's Pastry Shop for the report of an armed robbery that had just occurred. A subsequent investigation into this second incident revealed that it was a fraudulent complaint as two juvenile males had placed a crank call to the 911 communication center.

Once cleared from the suspected armed robbery, Officer Formby responded to the now cold call for the vandalism. Upon investigating this report, Officer Formby gathered detailed descriptions of the parties involved and located the victim. Officer Formby determined that there were a number of personal items stolen from the vehicle, including a cellular telephone.

Officer Formby called the stolen cellular telephone several times and was eventually able to speak to the suspects who had it in their possession. Officer Formby posed as the victim of the theft and negotiated a meeting with the suspects. Officer Formby convinced the suspects that he was desperate to have the cellular phone returned. The suspects agreed to meet and sell the phone back for \$500.00.

Detectives Jones and Haselow then worked with Officer Formby to set up the transaction. After a failed initial attempt, detectives were able to set up a meet with the suspects at the McDonald's Restaurant in Shorewood Hills.

Plain clothes detectives were able to make contact with two suspects at this location. The stolen property was recovered and both suspects were arrested. Charges of Criminal Damage to Property, Larceny and Attempted Extortion have been filed with the Dane County District Attorney.

During the month of April, 79 case files were sent to the investigative supervisor for review. Of these, eight cases were assigned to patrol officers and 36 new cases were assigned to various members of the ISB team. These case files include the following incident types:

SCHOOL LIAISON OFFICER REPORT

Middleton High School

Special thanks go out to Kromrey SRO Jill Tutaj for assisting at the Middleton High School while I was gone at a substantial amount of training throughout the month of April. Officer Tutaj took calls in all of the Middleton schools during my absence.

During the time that I was present, I was assigned as primary on a total of 17 calls for service. That included three status offenses, two thefts, two lost property, two

information, two disturbances, and one each of 911 disconnect, assist other department, check property, uniform controlled substance, damage to property, and check welfare.

These calls resulted in a total of 12 citations. This included three for truancy, two for resisting or obstructing an officer, two for prohibited daytime loitering by minors, and one each for underage alcohol consumption, possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia, damage to property, and receiving stolen property.

Starting on April 27, Officer Travis Kakuske began his work at the Middleton High School. Officer Kakuske will be working with me through the end of the school year and he will be taking over the School Resource Officer position on his own starting this fall.

Kromrey Middle School

April's call activity was very high. During April, I filled in at the high school for two weeks.

During April, I had Officer Matt Sherry with me for a week and started training him as he will be the new Kromrey officer next year.

At Kromrey we did another restorative circle for the same group of girls that have been having several altercations. While doing this, we came up with a plan to have all of the girls involved have an escort while at school. After a week of being escorted by an adult, the students will be able to earn points for good behavior and will earn their way to being alone again.

Also during April, I attended Kromrey's 4th Annual Spirit Night. This is a lock-in event that keeps the students at school until 10 PM with various events.

During April, I organized training for all Para-educators on the choking game. This was presented by two Dane County Deputies.

I also organized and took four students to Ethan Allen. The four students that were picked to go on this trip were recommended by staff members and have had problems in both school and in the community.

At the elementary school level, I did three internet safety presentations at Sauk Trail.

During April, I attended the weekly building consultation team meeting, the bi-weekly attendance meeting, the monthly Dane County School Resource Officer meeting and a Peer Court meeting.

In April, there were 27 documented calls for service. These included six disturbances, a status offense, three check property, a 911 disconnect, six information calls, two traffic complaints, one sexual conduct, a found property, a theft, a uniformed controlled

substance. I was also assigned a damage to property which resulted in six citations for disorderly conduct.

I issued eight tickets for disorderly conduct, one for obstructing, one for possession for paraphernalia, one for truancy, and one for loitering. I also issued two state charges for theft.
